

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# Arbitrator's decision on parental leave goes against us, but we will fight on regarding other issues

**W**e finally received the decision in the parental leave case. Unfortunately, it is not the one we had hoped for. The arbitrator ruled against us. This case was about whether

our members were contractually entitled to paid parental leave equivalent to that granted to other Boston Police Department employees by the City's Paid Parental Leave Ordinance. We have a provision in our Contract that states that "[i]n the event any statute(s) relating to members of the Police Department provides or sets forth benefits or terms in excess of or more advantageous than the benefits or terms of this Agreement, the provisions of such statute(s), to the extent not forbidden by law, shall prevail." Since the City's Paid Parental Leave Ordinance gives other Boston Police Department employees (that are not unionized) paid parental leave, the Union brought this grievance arguing that our bargaining unit members should be receiving it too.

Why did she rule against us? Good question. Her opinion (which is short – a little over three pages) states that an "ordinance" is not a "statute." This is despite the fact we submitted a Supreme Court Case that states "a city ordinance is a law of the state" and the definition by *West's Dictionary* that defines an "ordinance" as "[a] law, statute, or regulation enacted by a Municipal Corporation", the *Law Dictionary* that defines an "ordinance" as "a statute enacted by a city or town", and *Burton's Legal Thesaurus* that lists "statute" as a synonym for "ordinance." I will not list the myriad

of Massachusetts court cases we also submitted that regard ordinances as statutes – we submitted them all. Then how did she explain not following the Supreme Court and the dictionary??!

She. Does. Not. She basically just says they are two different words, and says that parties intended to differentiate between the two words – even though neither side introduced any evidence of that.

So why don't we appeal it? Because as frustrating as this decision is, we have been told by our legal counsel that an appeal in court would likely not be successful. Courts cannot turn over an arbitrator's decision even if the arbitrator gets the facts wrong or the law wrong – both of which happened in this case. Arbitration awards are one of the most difficult decisions to overturn – it is the reason why the courts could not overturn the decision we received in the Dave Williams case, for which we are grateful.

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
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But we are not giving up. Because of this decision, which was unfortunate and unexpected – I promise you that the BPPA will make this a priority in negotiations.

Also, now that Phase II of the pilot program for body worn cameras is over, for the officers that wore the camera, make sure you received the \$500 stipend and the C-days that you are owed. Any officers that wore the camera for four or more months should receive one C-day, eight or more months should receive two C-days, and if you wore the before or on November 12, 2016 until the end of the program, you should get three C-days total (but you don't get the third one until January 21, 2018).

# Q: Where do “extra officers / beefed-up patrols” come from?

# A: From our families’ social events, birthday parties and barbeques

As I sit here contemplating my Fall, 2017 article for the *Pax*, I was listening to the local news reporting on the many events scheduled for the Columbus Day weekend. According to the BPD, due to unspecified threats - police patrols were being “beefed up” and the BPD was “adding extra officers”. Among the many events scheduled for the Holiday weekend were:

Red Sox-Houston Astros playoff games, Tufts 10K road race, Boston College-Virginia Tech football game, Columbus Day parade, Bruno Mars concert, Dorchester Irish Festival, BAA Half-Marathon, regularly scheduled Bruins and Celtics games, a host of block parties needing streets closed/detoured, several protests needing escorts, paving crews, utility work, etc. etc. and a list of permits and city-approved activities too numerous to mention. This was before and in addition to a plethora of fixed-post assignments, “regular” overtime replacement units, weekend gang cars and an uncountable number of special assignments that the BPD and City Hall had promised various community groups would be addressed by the police during their “routine patrols”.

It was all I could do to prevent myself from laughing out loud; what, pray tell, constitutes “routine patrol” anymore? In

point of fact, despite the department’s assertions to the contrary in front of community meetings, there are no “sector cars” anymore that routinely canvas a defined geographical area during “routine patrols”, as they did years ago. From the time a patrol officers’ shift starts until it ends (and with the onerous amount of ordered overtime to fill even basic minimum manning requirements, even the so-called, regular “end of shift” has become an “iffy” proposition), officers are routinely sent from call to call, report to report, assignment to another assignment. Officers often complain about being called while writing one report to put *that* report on “hold” and respond to yet another call. Therefore, reports are often stacked up at the mythical “end” of one’s shift for completion. A “code 10” is often interrupted in mid-meal by a radio call or a citizen demanding assistance/ police intervention. (Does anyone really wonder why so few cops take meal breaks in

public restaurants anymore?)

And only recently has the City and the BPD begun to realize the seriousness of the situation by hiring additional younger officers. Whether the 117 officers currently in the Academy or the other classes to be hired next year will have much of an actual impact remains to be seen; if the numbers of officers becoming eligible to retire, contemplating or actually planning retirement hold true, the officers we will be losing between January 2018 -July 2019 (last yr.% raise of BPPA contract) will barely be replaced by new hires; hiring (“plus”) and attrition (“minus”)

cancelling each other out....

## Retirement information

Speaking of retirement, if you are receiving a retirement or pension allowance from the Boston Retirement Board, you and your family members are still eligible to participate in City of Boston health insurance. Family members generally include spouses, children until they reach age 26, and disabled children over age 26 (if they who depend on you for principal support and are unable to earn a living on their own due to a mental or physical condition, provided the disability began before age 19 or prior to age 26 while dependent on you for principal support). Retirees pay the same percentage of the health insurance premiums as active employees – they are withheld from your monthly retirement/pension check and are collected one month in advance. If you are enrolled in Flexible Spending (the program that allows you to set aside a portion of your paycheck tax free to pay for expenses such as dependent care, medical/dental care, and work related parking fees and mass transit), make sure you don’t lose any money the year you retire. You can only use your Flexible Spending debit card up to your retirement date. After you retire, you have until the end of the plan year (December 31) to submit paper claims for services that you incurred prior to your retirement date. If there’s money on that account and you don’t use it up, you don’t get it back – so plan accordingly.

Also, remember that the BPPA also provides the option for retirees to continue dental coverage. Any dental coverage plans available to active members are available to retirees.

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# BPD officers cleared by D.A. Conley in tragic shooting of knife-wielding man

## Despite attempts by radical opportunists to politicize and racialize a mentally-ill man's assault on police, EMTs

Despite detestable efforts by racist, cop-hating “activists” and their pro-bono radical-progressive legal advocates, Suffolk County D.A. **Dan Conley**, after an exhaustive and thorough investigation, completely vindicated the officers who were involved in the tragic but unavoidable circumstances leading to the death of a mentally-ill man, **Terrance Coleman**, at 245 Shawmut Ave, South End, on October 30<sup>th</sup>, 2016.

(Excerpts taken verbatim from D.A. Conley's report): “*The investigation ...revealed that Officer Boyle acted in the lawful exercise of his duties, both in self-defense and the defense of others. ...Officer Boyle fired his service weapon only after Mr. Coleman had attacked two...EMT's...who had been called to the home by Mr. Coleman's mother... her son suffered from “schizophrenic paranoia”... and had not taken medication... During the attack, Mr. Coleman knocked one of the EMT's to the ground and attempted to stab him with a ten-inch kitchen knife...Mr. Coleman attempted to stab the officers too...*” [footnote 1- Page 2] “*neither the responding officers nor the EMT's were informed that, twice in the past, police had been called to the home to respond to incidents in which the defendant acted erratically and wielded a knife.*”

But, once again, as has become the *raison d'être* (reason for living) for the demented racists of the American political left, the **FACTS** cannot be allowed to disrupt the political narrative. And the desired political narrative of the cop-haters is: “the brutal, evil racist police officers killed an innocent, unarmed black man who was suffering from mental illness.” Any **FACTS** that interrupt that political narrative must be repudiated and dismissed as part of the vast, right-wing police conspiracy. The drum of racism must be beaten continuously until it literally supplants the truth, as Josef Goebbels (Hitler's minister of propaganda – “*a lie, repeated often enough, becomes the truth...*”) would have nodded in approval. Or, as the legendary British poet Rudyard Kipling said eloquently in his famous poem “*If*” about the spoken truth “*...twisted by knaves, to make a trap for fools...*”

The “Lawyers Committee for Civil Rights and Economic Justice” (*the name alone tells you everything you need to know; in practical effect, they represent neither...*) issued a statement following D.A. Conley's exhaustive report saying that “...the decision by D.A. Conley continues a disturbing national pattern of prosecutors failing to hold police officers accountable for fatal shootings of black men,” said [LCCR staff attorney] **Sophia Hall**. She was followed in the press statement by drivel offered by (the aptly-named) Attorney

**Daniel Marx**, who offered his opinion about training issues in regards to interactions between the police and mentally ill persons.

Of course, what neither Attorney Hall nor Attorney Marx can offer, other than their obscene and obvious hatred of police officers, is any viable, legitimate option that the police officers might have had when dealing with a knife-wielding, mentally-ill man in a very tightly-confined hallway foyer who had slashed at two EMT's attempting to help him and was now using the 10"-long kitchen knife – *which his Mother insisted he did not possess, but crime-scene photos prove otherwise-* to attack them during a violent struggle.

**NO**, neither Attorney Hall nor Attorney Marx – neither of whom were physically present as were the EMT's and police officers– can offer any concrete answers to what alternatives the officers might have employed while

dealing with this knife-wielding madman because A.) **There were none**, other than the actions the officers were forced to take, and B.) because egomaniac, politically-driven attorneys who pontificate from behind the safety of their desks and sue people and governments and businesses to collect their contingency fees while criticizing the cops who protect them are among the lowest forms of life on earth. I can only guess what the barristers of the Lawyer's Committee would do if, for example, a knife-wielding, mentally-ill, paranoid-schizophrenic client upset with their representation had entered their offices at 61 Batterymarch St. or 100 Franklin St.? Would they call the police? Or would they try to reason with him? Perhaps engage in the much-ballyhooed “de-escalation” tactics which they are so familiar with? What if the mentally-ill man was swinging his knife in their office board- room while they were holding a meeting, similar to the tight confines of the foyer where our officers encountered Mr. Coleman? Please, by all means, Attorney Hall and Attorney Marx, instruct us brutal, ignorant, racist cops on exactly how to handle this situation, and all within the split-seconds afforded the officers who had the misfortune to be assigned to the Coleman call on that night.

Although it took an enormous amount of time, the BPPA and the Officers and their families are thankful the agony of waiting for a definitive, final report is over. And although the attacks and frivolous lawsuits from cop-hating, politically-motivated lawyers will not end any time soon, the Officers have been vindicated and should, at least, rest assured that their actions were just, legal, proper and totally correct in light of the circumstances they encountered almost a year ago.






# “Public wants tougher enforcement on Boston Common...”

*Of what and against whom exactly...?*

**P**ERHAPS IT IS MY ADVANCING AGE or the jaded cynicism with which 38 years on this job has infected me, but every time I hear that the public is, once again, pointing the fickle finger of blame at the police for “lack of enforcement” over a crime issue, I have an overwhelming sense of *déjà vu*. I remember hearing the same calls for “beefed-up” patrols, and “tougher enforcement” and “zero tolerance” back in the 80’s, and the 90’s and 2000\_\_\_\_\_ (fill in the blank). As it inevitably ended up, the “beefed-up” patrols were full of bovine excrement (*because the “beef” only existed by virtue of forced, mandatory, overtime shifts of already-exhausted officers*), and the only “zero tolerance” ended up being for the cops who actually engaged in “tougher enforcement”.

Smoking marijuana on the Common is generally not enforced,*” Shukla, said, adding that “*homelessness, opioid drug use and fights are also problems.*” Emerson College President **Lee Pelton**...said Emerson students...were really shaken, still feeling afraid” after the shooting.” (Ahmm, not for nothing, but... would those “shaken and afraid” Emerson students be the same ones who consistently follow police officers and shove cellphone cameras in their faces when they attempt to make an arrest, President Pelton?)

The **FACTS** (and I know how inconvenient **FACTS** are) Mr. Shukla, Ms. Vizza, President Pelton, et al, are that, ***even more***

***than back in the 80’s and 90’s***, the police are, in practical effect, prevented and prohibited from effective law enforcement by the liberal permissiveness that much of the general public supported and now complains about! “*Drifters and vagrants camped out with suitcases,*” complains John Q. # Broken windows

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# Hundreds of cyclists participate in East Boston Police Ride to support Officers Cintolo and Morris

**O**n September 9, I had the privilege of joining hundreds of cyclists – most of them police officers, firefighters or EMPs – for the first leg of the 2017 Tour de Force 911 Memorial Ride. This year, the first leg, from Copley Square to Warwick, RI, was “the East Boston Police Ride” in honor of A-7’s own **Matt Morris** and **Richie Cintolo**. We were led for the first part of the ride by members of the BPD Bike Unit.

The Tour de Force was started in 2002 by New York City police detective **Robert DePaola**, who decided to ride his bike from the Pentagon to Ground Zero to honor the officers, firefighters, and other first-responders who were killed during the Sept. 11, 2001 terrorist attacks. He was joined by a small group of fellow New York City officers for the inaugural journey. A year later, the Tour de Force became a nonprofit charity. Today, about 250 riders from around the nation — many of them police officers, firefighters, or EMTs — participate in the bicycle trek to raise money to support the families of recently fallen police officers.

This year, the Tour de Force started in Boston and ended, after four long days of riding, at Ground Zero in Manhattan. The BPPA canteen truck was on hand all afternoon the day before the ride to feed participants as they arrived in town and registered for the ride.

In addition to the four day “main event,” for the past several years, riders can take part in a one day ride. This year, we rode in honor of Matt and Richie. BPD Lt. **Christopher Hamilton**, who’s been involved with the Tour de Force for many years, helped to organize the East Boston Police Ride, and deserves thanks for his efforts. Almost 100 riders participated in the East Boston Police Ride.

The ride on September 9 was one of the most enjoyable rides of my life. It was so inspiring to meet officers and police supporters from all over the country who come together annually for this great event. As we rode, I chatted with officers from Massachusetts, Colorado, New York, New Jersey, Virginia, California, and elsewhere. It was wonderful to see hundreds of riders (it would have been 30 more if the Florida contingent hadn’t been called to duty there for Hurricane Irma) riding through Boston and down to Providence. The camaraderie during the ride and grabbing a beer (or two, or three) afterward was rousing and inspiring. I met so many men and women who were riding in their fifth, sixth, or tenth Tour. The fact that they keep coming back year after year, devoting many hours to training and then almost a week to the ride, is a testament to what a great cause it is, and what a great time is had.

Of course, while the ride is great fun, it’s really about honoring the memory of fallen officers, and raising money for their families. This year, the 4-day tour raised approximately \$600,000, and again, monies from the East Boston Ride will be going to Matt and Richie to help with their recoveries. It was a great honor to be a part of it. Being a part of this ride reminded me of how dangerous a job of a police officer is, and I am grateful for your service and dedication in protecting our community.

After we arrived in Warwick, RI, those of us who were only riding the one day were bussed back to Boston. I wished I could have stayed to hang out with the rest of the riders, who left the next morning for a 97-mile ride through Connecticut. Next year, I think I’m in for the long haul.

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
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# ANTIFA/NAZIs: “Want six or a half-dozen?” The Nazis they were looking for... were right next to them

**D**URING THE ANTI-POLICE RIOT of August 19<sup>th</sup> (the grossly-biased liberal media and their political dependents keep referring to it as a “peaceful rally”, but we know what it was...) I was assigned to a squad composed mainly of officers over the age of 50, and bundled into a borrowed “P.A.L.” van for transport to the Common. We were supposed to be on “stand-by” at the Park St./Beacon St. side of the Common in front of the State House for the “anti-hate” rally which was taking place before the scheduled noontime “free-speech” rally. That part of the rally was taking place on the other side of the Common, at Tremont and Boylston.

For the most part, the crowd that we were assigned to monitor were the peace and love, aging-hippie, sign-carrying, social-justice warrior types. Self-righteous, morally-superior, candlelight-vigil, “progressive” types, certainly; but not in any way violent or disorderly. Other than a few argumentative hardheads insisting that their “right” to be heard was somehow more important than other people’s right to choose not to listen to their polemics, the crowd we were assigned to monitor was – at least at the start – generally peaceful. But there was an ominous event a few hours before the “hurray for my sign” rally: about 9 AM, when we first arrived on the

Common, a band of black-clad, kerchief-wearing, anarchist types had set up shop in the middle of the Common, complete with tables and a clothesline surrounding their gathering place to (obviously) expropriate that area of the public park for themselves and exclude others. They were soon moved along, but simply appeared to set up shop further inside the Common without any more police intervention into their activities. Being patrolmen and line supervisors, we simply follow orders and instructions during such events, but the fact that the ANTIFA /anarchists were physically present was foreboding. Undercover infiltration and “up-close, in-your-face” shadowing by our own “good-guy”, black-clad tactical units (of the type practiced and taught by the late, great, Deputy Supt. **Robert Hayden**) would have prevented a lot of what was to come later on that day, but that’s water over the dam now. I simply hope we learned a lesson for the next ANTIFA appearance (November???)

Occasionally, the idiot college kids (and their idiot parents who were reliving the sixties singing bad renditions of “*Michael, row your boat ashore...*,” “*Give peace a chance,*” and “*We shall overcome*”... ad nauseum) would wander over to us and ask, with that all-too-

I heard it on the news...*”. They’d return to the crowd, admire each other’s signs, take more selfies, congratulate each other on how virtuous they all were, and again look around for the non-existent Nazis or phantom Klansmen. (“*Dammit, they paid to see Nazis! Where were they?*”)

On the other side of the Common, trembling on the bandstand, were an eclectic band of 40 or 50 kooks supporting a cornucopia of causes and presenting a plethora of problems who were being removed in police wagons for their own safety. But much to the dismay of Muffy from Marblehead and Biff from Beverly, there were **NO NAZIS** and **NO KLANSMEN**, at least as far as the cellphone camera could see.

There were, though, ANTIFA fascists, anarchists, free-radicals and assorted troublemakers who knew the real purpose of the day: **an anti-police riot**. The “free speech” rally was just a cover for their true intentions. It was about that time, just as the last of the kooks were being moved off the bandstand, that the tenor and tone of the crowd seemed to change, and we could feel it. Upset at the appalling lack of uniformed Nazis and robed Klansmen, Mommy and Daddy the virtuous liberals wandered away to shop on Newbury St., leaving their spoiled-brat, progressive and privileged children on the Common to be baby-sat by the police. Slowly at first, we noticed the crowd peeling off in ones and twos, threes and fours, away from where they had been confronting our squad at Beacon/Joy Sts. to run towards the downtown crossing area. Instant-action, live-time social media was working its magic. Soon, we began hearing calls for help from beleaguered units clad only in soft-hats in the middle of the Downtown Crossing in front of Macy’s, the Corner Mall, Tremont/West St’s., and a host of other locations. The violent confrontations (which the major media insists did not occur) went on for several hours, with many lightly-protected officers separated from their desperately-needed riot gear by great distance, subjected to urine-filled bottles, rocks, fishing weights, trash, and assorted weapons. Only the arrival and intervention of riot-equipped officers from citywide EDT’s and **POP** platoons combined with some 33 arrests quelled the violent altercation.

# Boston Globe editorials: A Capacity for Mendacity with no regard for Veracity

**F**OR POLICE OFFICERS WHO WERE PHYSICALLY PRESENT AT THE “PEACEFUL RALLY” of August 19<sup>th</sup>, 2017 on the Boston Common, slanted, biased reporting from the *Boston Globe* and local major media sources comes as no great surprise; indeed, it has come to be expected as simply “par for the course”. But even the most cynical and jaded of police officers, long accustomed to gross and obvious examples of *Boston Globe* liberal bias, must be asking themselves, in the wake of the anti-police riot of August 19<sup>th</sup>, how fictionalized, blatantly false reporting and obscene lying has become such an ingrained part of the very fabric of the *Globe’s* editorializing.

On this page in the *Pax* is reprinted the *Boston Globe* editorial of Monday, August 21<sup>st</sup>, 2017, (“*Boston’s mettle is tested, but questions linger*”) composed by the *Globe’s* editorial board a day or so after the alleged “peaceful rally.” **By all means, READ IT, and read it well.** If nothing else, it clearly exposes the sick, warped, mindset that has taken over full control of the City’s predominant newspaper. Let’s examine some of the most blatant and outrageous of the lies perpetrated by the rich, privileged, elitist frauds who compose these daily insults to logic, reason and truth: (Emphasis added and *Pax* Editor’s comments follow italicized *Globe* quotes):

*“The far-right rally on Boston Common on Saturday tested the city’s capacity to allow unpopular, even **wicked** causes....”*

Hmmm... The word “**wicked**” is generally reserved to describe witches and witchcraft, or (ironically) as the title of the play which recently appeared on the marquee at Boston’s Opera House, just down the street from the Downtown Crossing area. On August 19<sup>th</sup>, the downtown crossing area, peaceful citizens out and about shopping and police officers were assaulted by **wicked** people wearing black uniforms and hiding their faces beneath kerchiefs while throwing urine-filled bottles at the police and destroying public and private property. **But the *Globe* editorial board did not employ the word “wicked” to apply to Antifa savages, rioters, or those who assaulted police. The small-mindedness of self-described “progressives” does not allow that happy buzzword “diversity” – which all good liberals pretend to “celebrate” – to apply to diversity of political opinion. **NO**, there were no “Nazis” (other than those wearing black kerchiefs and shouting down opposing viewpoints) or Klansmen present, much to the chagrin of the alt-left and disappointed college students, who had been promised such a show. The “50 or so rallygoers” were composed of a few naïve ninnyes who believed in their reality-challenged minds that they were *actually going* to hold a “free speech” rally

Oh, and it wasn’t just the *Globe*: WCVB-TV Channel 5 irresponsibly reported on their Friday night-before broadcast (6 PM, August 18<sup>th</sup>) that “We have learned that three to five Klansmen may be attending tomorrow’s rally – but they will be wearing plain clothes and not identifiable” (*Ed.: paraphrasing*). After hearing that outrageous, unattributed, anonymously-reported claim that undeniably helped to gin-up the alt-left mob (they were desperately searching for phantom Klansmen and Nazi – ghosts during the riot and responded to any and all false sightings by running like lemmings up and down adjacent Beacon Hill sidestreets) we learned that Channel 5 had previously called the Area A detail room to attempt to arrange three (3) detail officers to protect their own news crews on that day. (Naturally, there were no available officers to fill such a deplorable detail, but I have the order #’s from WCVB’s office requesting detail cops to meet them at Area A, 10 AM-6 PM, 8/19 for “escort coverage.”)

More than any other arrogant phrase in their ignorant and condescending editorial, this hits home with all officers who were physically present. As we know, there were many hours of violence, several civilians and officers assaulted, officers pelted with urine-filled bottles and push-cart hot-dog/drink vendors had their products stolen and vandalized by the “peaceful” protesters. This clearly shows that the *Globe’s* editorial board and journalists live in an alternate universe, denying the reality in front of them. The video and photographic proof exists and shows the violence and hatred directed at police officers, but the *Globe* denies it, pooh-poohing any evidence to the contrary. If the Antifa animals *“in black outfits showed up, made some noise, and then went*

*home...*,” then we hope the *Globe* editorial board members and journalists picked up their little darlings at the Alewife and Riverside MBTA stops and kept dinner warm for them after the riot, because the apples never fall far from the trees.

## Boston’s mettle is tested, but questions linger

**T**he far-right rally on Boston Common on Saturday tested the city’s capacity to allow unpopular, even wicked, causes. The city passed: the 50 or so rallygoers, who claimed to be marching for free speech but who have links to white supremacist groups were able to hold their event at Parkman Bandstand.

The tens of thousands of counterprotesters, meanwhile, were able to voice their emphatic disapproval. Waving signs, marching, and screaming at the far-right activists, they vastly outnumbered the tiny group at the bandstand. With the nation’s attention focused on Boston, the counterprotesters upheld the city’s reputation and provided living proof of the old adage that the best response to offensive speech is more speech.

Most importantly, there was no violence, apart from a few minor scuffles. The police arrested 33 people, some of whom apparently were detained for trying to block vehicles carrying the far-right demonstrators away.

Saturday put the lie to a common whine of the so-called alt right — the loose movement of anti-Semites, neo-Nazis, white supremacists, and freelance bigots emboldened by President Trump’s election — that they are somehow deprived of their free speech rights. Nonsense. If being mocked, booed, and heckled is the alt-right’s idea of censorship, it may be time to rethink who gets labeled a “snowflake” in today’s political environment.

The fears of “Antifa” violence directed at conservatives also turned out to be overblown. A few counterprotesters in black outfits showed up, made some noise, and then went home. Sorry, but left-wing cosplay isn’t a security threat comparable to neo-Nazi violence.

Still, while Saturday was mostly a success, it left a few disquieting questions.

Why was media restricted from the bandstand? It may be the case, as First Amendment specialists say, that the right to free speech doesn’t create a right to be heard, but it still would have been better had the public known exactly what the rallygoers were doing and saying. And had the event actually become violent, a media presence would have helped ensure a complete accounting.

And, what happens next? The far-right rally’s attendance may have been small, but if the election and the ensuing tumult have showed anything, it’s that the radicalized racist fringe is getting bigger and bolder. Screaming matches at rallies probably won’t change the minds of extremists; there needs to be a genuine effort to turn angry white people away from radicalism.

The huge response to Saturday’s rally should be seen as an important statement of public disgust toward vile groups and the hateful beliefs they espouse. But unpoisoning a poisonous movement will take longer than an afternoon, and more than just the city’s scorn.

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

# All eyes on the road

**W**hen it comes to cell phone use while driving, I am guilty as charged. Whether it's checking my email as I cross the Neponset Bridge en route to the office, browsing my twitter feed as I crawl through the O'Neill tunnel during rush hour or sending a text as I make my way down Melnea Cass toward BPD Headquarters, I can't seem to kick the habit. Although I blame some of it on the ever-worsening traffic around the City, that is not an excuse. The real reason I continue to break the law is because there's a good chance that I won't get caught. And, even if I do, I'd probably just appeal the ticket. Plus, everyone else does it.

Distracted driving is not a new issue by any stretch of the imagination. It has been going on for longer than Antifa protesters have been wearing Birkenstocks. Some states, like neighboring Connecticut, ban cell phone use all together while just about all others have regulations restricting it. In Massachusetts, for example, the law prohibits drivers from using any mobile telephone or handheld device to browse the internet or write, send, or read an electronic message, even if the vehicle is stopped in traffic. And, as I am sure you have seen, billboards and television commercials condemning the act are very common. However, despite efforts to crack down, the number of motor vehicle crashes and fatalities linked to distracted driving rises considerably every year. In 2015, 3,477 people were killed and nearly 400,000 injured in crashes involving operators distracted by cell phones, a 9 percent increase as compared to 2014.

I handle a fair amount of OUI cases in my criminal defense practice and unless the client decides to take the case to trial, a typical first offense OUI disposition includes a one year Continuance Without a Finding (CWOFF), approximately \$2,000 in fees/fines, completion of a sixteen week alcohol class, a license suspension and a hefty insurance surcharge. Clients routinely tell me that the public and personal humiliation which accompanies an OUI will deter them from ever doing it again. I believe that. The stigma associated with an OUI is real. Many great people have lost careers and soiled reputations over them. But isn't texting while driving, which carries a \$100 civil fine, just as perilous and arguably just as reckless? I think so. Research has shown that when you are behind the wheel and want to fire off a text, the average time it takes to grab your phone, enter your password, pull up the text screen, type out an actual text and hit send can be upwards of twenty seconds. Although your head is bobbing up and down trying to maintain a view of the roadway, your eyes can be completely off the road for more than five seconds. If you are checking Facebook or Instagram, double that. It is scary.

I understand that the Boston Police are not known for traffic enforcement per se so this article may be a tad misplaced. And apart from new prospective customers for my firm, I am not necessarily advocating that texting or using the internet while driving should be a criminal offense. For one, it is very difficult to prove. Unlike breathalyzers and field sobriety tests, there is rarely evidence



to corroborate simple observations. Additionally, seizures of phones would create all sorts of 4<sup>th</sup> Amendment issues. Nonetheless, over the past few months, I know that some local police departments have received grants specifically air marked to curb distracted driving. The Quincy Police Department received \$20,000 this spring from the Executive Office of Public Safety to add patrols aimed at identifying and stopping motorists improperly using cell phones. Similarly, the Brookline Police completed a sting operation over the summer where officers dressed up like Boston sports fans, wearing Patriots and Bruins gear, and nabbed unassuming offenders. If anything, it brought awareness to the issue. I can only hope that more proactive policing such as this occurs - even in our great City of Boston - to give people

like me an incentive to put down the phone. I would also urge the legislature to consider stronger penalties such as a \$1,000 fine or an automatic tow for a first offense and mandatory license suspension for recidivists. This could go a long way in bucking the current trend. Ok, as Forrest Gump once said, "That's all I have to say about that." Stay safe out there, enjoy the crisp fall weather and don't forget to tip your bartender.

# Fast turnaround for Police Academy Graduates

After over six months of training at the Boston Police Academy, the 56 new recruits of class 56-16 spread over the districts to begin their careers as police officers. They are young enthusiastic men and woman ready to embark on hopefully long careers. One of the many things our excellent academy staff will impart on these new recruits is advice in order to prepare them for some of the things their district training officers will do or say. Certainly, one thing they will say is that we as training officers will at one point tell them “forget what they taught you in the academy, ‘cause out here it's different.” While that may be partially true, it was something I planned not to say, as I wanted to let the recruit I was training to experience this for him/herself and formulate his/her own opinion.

What I didn't know was that within two hours of my assigned recruit's first night on the job, she was going to get an awakening to a scenario she didn't expect about life “on the streets”.

That after six months of envisioning and wondering about how exciting her first shift was going to be, she instead would be rocking back and forth on her heels while we guarded a prisoner at the Tufts Medical Center Emergency Room. Six months of defensive tactics, weekly quizzes, level 1's and 2's, morning runs and PT, getting yelled at – sir, yes sirs; ma'am, yes ma'am; push-ups, sit-ups, motivational speeches about how awesome being a cop was going to be!?!?!? Right??? All this came to a screeching halt two hours into her first shift as a police officer, as she stood with me in the Emergency Room while we guarded a prisoner. I'm sure that if he didn't get arrested the day before for home invasion, he would most certainly have brought himself to the hospital because of his altered mental status. Wait, that was his first trip. He definitely would have not forgotten to come to the ER to address his chest pain. I'm sorry, I was not there for that trip either. That was his second trip earlier that day; my mistake. This trip, he most certainly would have realized how his life went south and decided to tell the booking officers that he “didn't want to live anymore.” Yeah, that's it. Oh, and his feet hurt. Thats right. That was why he went to the ER for the third time. Yes, the third time in 18 hours after being arrested on a Friday afternoon. I'm sure if the DK01 didn't grab him and he got away, he was heading right to the nearest medical facility to tackle all of these ailments. That's enough sarcasm for now. . . .

What was difficult for me was explaining the rationale for bringing a prisoner, who everyone, including the prisoner himself, knows is faking, to the hospital to satisfy his goal of getting out of the cell and laying in a hospital bed for a few hours before heading back to station with his body recharged with IV fluids, graham crackers and gingerale.

I guess It's not difficult explaining the reason why we immediately call for EMS transport to the hospital; its **LIABILITY** plain and simple. A prisoner really attempts to kill himself and the book is rewritten. I understand, “it is what it is.” We have to abide by the rules that are currently in place. I also understand not all of the prisoners awaiting court the next day or after the weekend **ARE** faking. Obviously some have medical conditions that require them taking medicine or treating an injury that occurred before or during the arrest. That's a small percentage of the trips. Most arrested know how to play the system to their advantage, what the “keywords” are that will automatically get them out of the cell and have them laying comfortably on a hospital bed while an ER doctor (mostly students) ask them in a cheery voice, “So, what brings you in here today?”

Excuse me while I roll me eyes. Also, pretending not to see the two policemen standing there and the fact that their “patient” is in handcuffs and sometimes shackles.

Maybe some reading this are thinking “stop whining,” it's part of the job so just suck it the eff up and do it. We all have to at some point. Believe me, that's how I get through each hospital trip. Saying to myself, “just get through it.” Don't be pissy at the prisoner for manipulating the system, or in some cases (not a lot, but the feeling **IS** there) nurses and doctors who barely acknowledge your presence or who do acknowledge you but look at you with contempt as if it is your fault that the prisoner is in this predicament.

There are a few reasons why this last trip caused me to start typing away here. One was trying to explain to a young recruit that this is unfortunately something they don't teach you in the academy. Two, the unbelievable cost that occurs with each trip to the ER that would in my humble opinion would 100% not happen if the person was not incarcerated and was free to walk themselves in for treatment. The absolute biggest reason is Officer safety, which I will get to in a minute.

With manpower at a all-time low, minimum staffing levels being decreased (at least in D4 they were), call volume at an all-time high (no more call screening) all across the city with the population in city's districts skyrocketing, patrol districts are being spread ridiculously thin. With some dispatchers acting like the Ron Burgundy's of the dispatch world reading whatever is on the teleprompter, if you will. An actual call was dispatched to a rapid in D4 for, wait for it. . . . Crickets chirping. Not making that up and sorry but I just went off the rails for a minute.

Point is, with all of these issues, rapids across the city, I'll speak for D4, A1, and C6 for certinly being tied up with prisoners at the hospitals on top of everything else. DS's in the past hired overtime for this if a prisoner had a lengthy stay, but now there is already tons of forced ordering going on and this practice is just not an option for the supervisors anymore. These three to some times 72 hour hospital stays are taxing an already taxed patrol force.

The medical cost that this situation creates is not a drop in the bucket either. I'm not going to drop exact cost/numbers here but let's just take the typical ER visit for a prisoner. 1,200 ambulance run. Initial patient assessment, IV fluids, x-rays, blood tests, urine tests, EKG's, Snacks!! Don't forget the snacks...how about things that don't have price tag on it; the time taken away from “real patients.” Doctors, nurses, technicians, volunteers, hospital security. And while we're at it, throw in an EEG test because we may as well have someone's goddam head examined for allowing this waste to continue. Oh yeah, I forgot that I have never had one ER registration coordinator ask what medical coverage they have. Why? Because we are picking this tab up. Add that cost times three for the prisoner that went to the ER for the triple, recently. Not to mention that he dropkicked a television monitor when he knew the heart problem gig was up after the EKG. So, he had to go with the “I'm crazy” road and violently flailed around screaming until he managed to get his leg over the stretcher and damaged the monitor. Oscar-worthy...

I left the safety of the officers, nurses, doctors, civilians, etc. last, but it is the most important issue here. We know our jobs are inherently dangerous, “we signed up for this right?” Gun calls, domestics, bar fights, traffic stops, unknown calls for service, EDP's. The list is endless about how a simple call could turn disastrous. Its part of the job. We can't plan for what we don't know; we only

have our training and experience to guide us. But all of these scenarios are before the arrest. So why, after the arrest, do we take such huge risks with our precious "safety?" Why is that placed on the back burner? We take a prisoner that has been arrested out of our secure holding cells where we are not allowed to even bring our weapons into because of safety concerns and take them to a unsecured open area where **ANYONE** can walk into off the streets and be within two feet of us and our "patient." Is it not in the realm of possibility that someone knows of a prisoner who has been arrested and has been transported to an unsecure facility? And they would like to see that person suffer more in some way? They wouldn't even need to bring their own weapon as there is the potential for endless items that could be used as weapons against a prisoner as well as the officers guarding them. Again, the word I keep repeating is **UNNECESSARY**. Yes, they are handcuffed, but they are also carted into X-ray rooms, bathrooms, treatment rooms. Nurses are always asking if they "need to be handcuffed." We take such precautions in our stations with the prisoners. No one is allowed back to the holding cells to see or talk with prisoners (except lawyers i know). No firearms, No one officer booking, we

are at our most cautious when booking prisoners, especially violent ones. So why are we continually throwing all of that out the window and taking these unnecessary risks because of liability? Yes, they **ARE** unnecessary because 90% of the time there is no reason for them to leave the cell. Let alone be transported to a hospital ER that is basically a funhouse of potential weapons for any prisoner who really wants to hurt us.

There have been escapes, assaults and damages to hospital equipment by these "patients." Officers and medical personnel have been spit on, bit, verbally abused (that's not a big deal, cause we are used to that already) all **AFTER** being arrested and placed in a secure holding cell. None of these incidents have moved the needle to come up with a better course of action for prisoners who already have been arrested. I won't say it in print as I am a superstitious man, but does some horrific act have to happen to one of our officers for this unnecessary risk to be corrected?

In this unprecedented era of anti-police violence and rhetoric, it is hard enough to keep ourselves as well as the public safe. Why are we voluntarily ignoring our rules and precautions because a prisoner decides he wants to be a patient?

# Enormous victory for the BPPA in Supreme Judicial Court

**O**n July 12, the highest court in Massachusetts finally came down with its long-awaited decision in the David Williams arbitration case. The decision is an enormous legal victory for the BPPA and vindication for Officer Williams. The Court flatly rejected spurious legal claims by the City of Boston and the Police Commissioner purporting to give the Commissioner virtually total control over Boston Police Officers.

From a legal perspective, this case began in 1906, when a Republican, Protestant Legislature, fearing that political control of Boston was devolving to its immigrant, Catholic, and largely Irish immigrant population, enacted a law providing that the Governor, not the Mayor, would appoint the Boston Police Commissioner. That law, updated in 1962 (by then, the Legislature had deemed the Mayor sufficiently trustworthy to appoint the Police Commissioner), gives the Commissioner "...cognizance and control of the government, administration, disposition and discipline of the department, and of the police force of the department..."

In 1974, the Legislature passed a comprehensive public sector labor law, Chapter 150E. Section 7 of this law says that if any conflict arises between a negotiated collective bargaining agreement and certain other laws, the terms of the agreement must prevail. In practice, this provision allows decisions of arbitrators to supersede those of mayors, police chiefs, or boards of selectmen. In the mid-90's, a few court decisions were decided against the BPPA because the powers of the Commissioner were not among those listed as being subordinate to collective bargaining in Section 7.

In 1998, the BPPA, with support from the other Boston police unions and other unions, police and non-police, succeeded in passing legislation which amended Chapter 150E to include the regulations of a police commissioner among those subordinated to collective bargaining. The City and Commissioner Paul Evans vigorously fought the legislation but to little avail. When Acting Governor Cellucci vetoed the bill, the House overrode it 139-7 and the Senate 37-0. I testified before a joint legislative committee in support of the bill, and the legislators were dumbfounded when Paul Evans tried to explain to them that he needed more powers than the police chiefs in the cities and towns in their districts. Until July 12, 2017, this obscure legislative enactment had been given little, if any, effect.

After Officer Williams was fired by the Commissioner (at the time, Davis) for using excessive force in making an arrest and then lying about it, the BPPA appealed to an arbitrator. The arbitrator found that Williams had neither used excessive force nor lied. Under existing law, that should have been the end of the case; arbitrators' factual findings are supposed to be conclusive and final. But the Police Commissioner, Legal Advisor, and their minions at City Hall, armed with unlimited taxpayer funds, appealed to the courts. When their private, outside counsel argued to the SJC that pesky

arbitrators have no business second-guessing the Commissioner because the "police commissioner's statute leaves discipline and discharge of officers for excessive force or untruthfulness to the commissioner's exclusive managerial control," the Court threw the 1998 amendment back at them. The collective bargaining law permits an "arbitrator to interpret regulations promulgated pursuant to the commissioner's statute, and usurps no authority in so doing," the Court said. The net effect is to leave the police commissioner in Boston with the same powers as any other police chief, no less, but certainly no more.

Officer Williams can now return to work after five long years of litigation. This decision is a victory for the collective bargaining process: the Supreme Judicial Court held the City to its collectively-bargained promise that it must prove that it has just cause for disciplining or discharging a Boston Police Officer. It is also a victory for the rule of law. In the face of great public controversy over police conduct and attacks on police unions from the political left and right, the justices of the SJC courageously applied the law.



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
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# Chronology of the Boston Police Department

## Some important dates

- 1635:** First night watch established.
- 1788:** The word “Police” appeared for the first time; designate a specific office, “Inspector of Police”.
- 1822:** The Town of Boston became the City of Boston. Increases in the population and in the number of businesses operating created increased demand for police patrol.
- 1825:** Watchman Jonathan Houghton killed in the line of duty Monday, December 19, 1825 Assault. 1st Watchman to be killed in the line of duty.
- 1838:** Law passed permitting day patrol. City had a Day Police and a Night Watch, which by all accounts operated completely independently of one another.
- 1848:** Watchman David Estes killed in the line of duty Thursday, April 27, 1848 Gunfire
- 1851:** First Irish Born Police Officer appointed to the Boston Police November 1851 Officer Bernard “Barney” McGinniskin. Officer McGinniskin served for (3) Three years before he was fired for being Irish Catholic. The Emerald Society of Boston and The Boston Police Department Would dedicate a Memorial/Gravestone to Patrolman McGinniskin at St. Augustine Cemetery in South Boston on March 17, 2010.
- 1852:** The Metal badges were issued – a six point star made of brass.
- 1853:** First Harbor Patrol Established.
- 1854:** Boston Police Department established, structured after the model developed by Sir Robert Peele for the London police force.
- 1857:** P.O. Ezekiel W. Hodsdon, first Boston Police Officer to be killed in the line of duty Oct. 18, 1857. Officer Hodsdon was shot in the back of the head attempting to arrest two suspects for a burglary in East Boston. On Oct 18, 2007, the Boston Police dedicate a permanent memorial at the same location Officer Hodsdon was murdered.
- 1858:** Telegraph system completed, linking central office and police stations.
- 1861:** White cotton gloves worn by the officers for the first time. Thereafter, “full uniform” included the wearing of such gloves.
- 1870:** 180 “night walkers” were arrested; most were placed on probation and sent home.
- 1872:** The Great Boston Fire of November 9 and 10 which destroyed 776 buildings. The fire was discovered by a patrolman who was chasing boys on Lincoln Street.
- 1873:** First mounted patrol established in the United States.
- 1878:** First African-American Police Officer appointed to the Boston Police December 25, 1878. Horatio J. Homer who would later retire with the rank of Sgt. on Jan. 1919 after 41 years



of service. The Boston Police would later find out that Sgt Homer was buried in an unmarked grave and they would erect a Gravestone for Sgt Homer and his wife Lydia on June 26, 2010.

- 1883:** Department Headquarters moved from City Hall to 37 Pemberton Square.
- 1889:** Statute passed providing for right-of-way for patrol wagons and ambulances.
- 1903:** First motorized patrol wagon placed in service – a Stanley Steamer touring car operated by a chauffeur; the police officer sat on higher seat so that he could look over high fences.
- 1906:** First Italian-born Boston Police Officer appointed to the Boston Police Andrew B. Cuneo, May 9, 1906.
- 1919:** May Day Riots – Captain Hugh Lee and Patrolman Adolph Butterman are killed in the line of duty, Captain Lee of a heart attack and Patrolman Butterman by gun shot. This is the first time in the Department’s history two Boston Police Officers are killed during the same event. Captain Hugh Lee after research was placed onto the National Law Enforcement Memorial on May 13, 2012.
- 1919:** Boston Police Department Strike – 1,117 policemen went on strike. The officers were not allowed to return to work and were replaced by new officers who received the benefits the striking officers had tried to obtain; salaries were increased, more frequent days off, and uniforms were furnished at department expense.
- 1921:** First Italian-born Boston Police Officer killed in the line of duty. Officer Andrew B. Cuneo was shot in the line of duty on August 13, 1921. On October 26, 2011, the Boston Police would dedicate a memorial to Patrolman Andrew B. Cuneo at the “Prado” in the North End of Boston.
- 1925:** New Department Headquarters built at 154 Berkeley Street.
- 1940:** St. Valentine’s Day blizzard immobilized the city.
- 1942:** Coconut Grove fire, resulting in the death of 490 people and injury to 166.
- 1950:** Famous Brink’s robbery occurred in the Brink’s garage on Commercial Street in the North End of Boston.
- 1972:** Improved radio communication system placed in service, including “911.”
- 1974:** Court ordered busing began, requiring the deployment of large forces throughout the city.
- 1978:** The Great Blizzard of 1978 hit, immobilizing the city for several days.
- 1995:** Mobile data terminals become operational, allowing for prioritization of emergency calls.
- 1997:** Boston Police Department moves into its current state-of-the-art Headquarters facility at One Schroeder Plaza.



# Openly filming police still OK according to the courts, and be careful about Fentanyl

Some of you may have heard that there's a new decision out by the Eighth Circuit that has ruled that there is no First Amendment right to videotape police officers in public. This is not true. The case stems from a lawsuit filed by Matthew Atkins, alleging that his constitutional rights were violated by numerous encounters he had with police officers in Columbia, Missouri. The only encounters that arguably had to do with filming police were (1) being "stopped from filming a citizen in the Police Department lobby", (2) having links to the "Citizens for Justice Page [] removed from the Police Department's Facebook page"<sup>1</sup>, and (3) being "excluded from a Police Department Media Training Day."<sup>2</sup>

The Eighth Circuit case that has been reported by various media outlets does not actually discuss anything substantive about filming police; its main focus is on the appellant's motion for the judge to recuse herself, the denial of which the Eighth Circuit affirmed. The entire portion regarding the appellant's filming in the opinion is the following: "Atkins [appellant] also argues that the district court erred by granting the motions to dismiss and for summary judgment filed by the defendants and by denying his own motion for partial summary judgment. After careful de novo review, we conclude that the district court did not err in its thorough and well reasoned opinions. Accordingly, we affirm."<sup>3</sup>

So, off I go to read the district court opinion. It says three things on the encounters I mention above: (1) Atkins "has no constitutional right to videotape any public proceedings he wishes to" in addressing the filming in the lobby<sup>4</sup>, (2) "there is no constitutional right to unlimited posting" in addressing the removal of links from the Police Department's Facebook page, and (3) "media does not enjoy a right of equal access or special First Amendment rights" in addressing the media training event.<sup>5</sup> It seems that some people have taken that first finding and run with it to make headlines stating that citizens have no right to record police in public. This is not what the decision says. The decision says there is no right to videotape "any public proceeding he wishes to" and cites to another Eighth Circuit case holding that the First Amendment does not give the public or the media the right to videotape an execution. The decision says nothing about filming police officers while they are performing their official duties in public such as on the street.

What you should take away from this decision is that it changes nothing. Everybody here in Massachusetts still has the right to openly record a police officer, subject to reasonable restrictions (i.e., not interfere with police duties).

I now turn to an issue that affects officer safety and seems to be getting more and more dangerous – fentanyl. Fentanyl is approximately forty (40) times more powerful than heroin. New Hampshire and Massachusetts rank first and second in per-capita deaths caused by fentanyl, which has surpassed heroin as the leading cause of fatal opioid overdoses in these states.<sup>6</sup> Why does this affect officer safety? Because this stuff is so powerful that contact with the substance can lead to illness, possibly even death.

There have been reported incidents, including at least one Boston police officer that had to be hospitalized for evaluation and/or treatment after having contact with fentanyl. The Drug Enforcement Agency states that a dose the size of two grains of salt can be fatal. Now get this – there is now a stronger drug out there called carfentanil – which is one hundred (100) times more powerful than fentanyl and is designed to be an elephant tranquilizer. If the size of two grains of salt of fentanyl could be lethal, I don't want to imagine what a fatal dose of carfentanil is.

The lesson here – if you see something that could possibly be fentanyl or carfentanil, do not touch it, inform your supervisor, and let the ones who are trained and equipped to deal with these substances handle it. It is not worth you having an accidental ingestion of fentanyl or carfentanil, leading to sickness, and possible death. State police and other police departments have equipped their officers with protective gear such as hazmat suits and gas masks. We currently have masks and gloves – with some officers reporting that they may also have safety goggles. The Boston Police Department has not issued a formal policy or guide about what procedures should be followed when an officer comes across these substances. This is not sufficient. Please be safe out there and watch out for each other. Thank you for protecting us and the community, but remember to protect yourself too.

## SALT #16-17

A few years ago, the academy held classes in the auditorium. The auditorium could easily accommodate a large number of recruits in a classroom setting. Since then, however, the auditorium has been renovated and is now part of our world class fitness facility. The 130 needed a new home ...

The staff has worked hard at fitting this large group into our biggest classroom (Room 102), our Spartan cafeteria, and our meager locker facilities. Superintendent Holmes and Captain Richard Sexton were able to upgrade the classroom with fresh paint and state of the art audiovisual equipment, which has the ability to broadcast main classroom instruction to a secondary, remote classroom. # Joe O'Malley: "just the best-est guy"

## Founding member of BPPA Retired Officers Division passes away, "the end of an era"

Retired BPPA Officer's Division founding member and director **Joseph O'Malley**, 77, recently passed away after a long and courageous fight with cancer. With Joe's passing truly ends in era in community policing, but with the emphasis being upon the "community *OF* police officers".

Born in Dorchester in 1940 and serving in the USMC in the early 60's, Joe joined the BPD in 1965. Much of Joe's career was spent in Area A in Charlestown, where he and his sidekick (the late) Officer **Tommy Trainor** provided an ongoing replay of "Abbott and Costello" comedy routines with every call they answered together.

If you were Joe's friend, you knew it instantly. Joe was as gentle as a lamb, but strong as an ox, the best guy to show up if you called for an "O.T.". He constantly amazed people with his ability to walk on his hands, even after occasionally consuming moderate quantities of amber-colored fluids at off-duty events. Back when a real BPD intra-departmental softball league existed many years ago, which resulted in true camaraderie and lifelong-friendships, Joe invented the sacred "Five S's" - Summer, Sunday, Softball, Suds,



Sick-line". It was a tradition that ended slowly, shortly after Joe retired in 2003, the victim of mandatory overtime shifts and unpredictable work and family schedules.

As much as Joe loved the BPD, he valued family and friends much more. "Christmas is for kids," Joe would say, but Thanksgiving, Fourth of July and Super Bowl Sunday were no-holds-barred family events that began shortly after sunrise and lasted well into the night. When confronted with the choice of a family holiday and an overtime shift, the choice for Joe was clear. Family and friends first, money a distant second. Do your share, lift your part of the load, but keep your priorities straight.

I specifically recall the night of 9-11-01, that horrible, terrible day we were both on duty in Charlestown. After 4

PM rollcall, we both found ourselves on the long pier in Charlestown behind the cement factory, cursing the barbarian savages who had killed so many innocent people in those terrorist attacks. F18-US Air Force fighters circled through an empty sky. Not a single car passed over the nearby Tobin Bridge. For the first time in memory, not a single radio call was heard the entire tour throughout Charlestown; not a gang call, or a family fight or a car accident. The world had stopped. Joe remarked that we'd never see another night like this again, for the rest of our lives.

And he was right. We didn't.

We will all miss you, Joe. We will miss that guttural, un-imitable, un-describable, "noise"- that emanated from your gut and exited your raspy throat at softball games and barbeques that let people know, unmistakably, that Joe O'Malley was present. We'll miss the Fourth of July and the Super Bowl parties and your presence in the Blue Goose with your sidekick, **Bill Flippin**. We know where you are now, beyond the cement factory, past the end of the pier and over the Tobin Bridge, with Pauline and Stephen and Tommy and a whole slew of friends and family. Until we meet again, keep the cooler cold and full.

## Don't need a will? Think again... Just do it. Your heirs will thank you!

**D**oes everybody need a Will? The straight answer is yes. That's true even for people who think they don't have a dime to leave to anyone. What if you were in an accident and died later of injuries, and your estate won a \$1 million settlement? Who gets the money?

Admittedly, that's a little far out. You might get away without having a will if, say, you're a renter living on Social Security with no savings. If you have savings, a pay-on-death account will pass that money to named beneficiaries when you die.

But there are hitches to any no-will scheme, says attorney Patrick Lamon of Bilzin Sumberg in Miami. To begin with, a random financial asset almost always turns up. Examples might be a rental deposit that's returned or a medical reimbursement. Those checks will be made out to the deceased. How do your heirs get them cashed?

If you had a will, you'd have named an executor to cash checks, pay off creditors and distribute any money or property to your beneficiaries. Without one, your heirs will have to ask a court to appoint a personal administrator. Usually, it will appoint your surviving spouse or a child. But you risk a family fight over who should be in charge.

Some couples try to go will-free by putting everything into joint names. Joint assets pass to the other owner automatically. So do assets with beneficiary forms, such as individual retirement accounts. But something is inevitably left out typically, a car, Lannon says.

Heirs would need an administrator to transfer title. Even if the joint-asset strategy works for the first death, what happens when the other spouse dies? He or she should make a will, which you both could have done from the start.

When there's no will, state law dictates who gets the house, car, savings and other assets. Those laws vary widely. A surviving spouse might get everything in one state but only one-third in another, with the rest going to your children. If you have no children, half might go to a spouse and half to your parents.

Lawyers are the best source for reliable wills. Your lawyer will also remind you that you need a durable power of attorney and a health care proxy, so someone can manage your finances and make medical choices if you're unable to do so yourself.

If you're allergic to lawyers, you can find free, state-specific will forms online. In most states (not all), handwritten wills are also accepted, provided that they were witnessed properly. DIY should be better than nothing. But be careful.

APY increases can be initiated on the 34-month certificate if the then current APY for City of Boston Credit Union's 34-month certificate or 36-month certificate is above 1.40%, or on the 46-month certificate if the then current APY for City of Boston Credit Union's 46-month certificate or 48-month certificate is above 1.78% APY or on the 58-month certificate if the then current APY for City of Boston Credit Union's 58-month certificate or 60-month certificate is above 2.15%. In no event can the bump-up rate exceed the then current rate for the certificate. Dividends will be credited to your account and compounded every month. Upon maturity, 34-, 46- and 58-month Bump-Up Certificates will automatically rollover into the member's City of Boston Credit Union share account. All other certificate terms and conditions will apply. Minimum deposit of \$500. Deposits can not be made during the term of the account. Rates may change after account is opened. Fees could reduce earnings. Subject to penalty for early withdrawal. Not available for IRA Certificates. Must be a member of City of Boston Credit Union to open certificate account.
